Following January's terrible earthquake in Haiti, Through the Roof has set up a special fund for future projects work there, called 'Wheels 4 Haiti'.

Much of the initial giving to Haiti is for alleviating the immediate crisis. Even as the story falls away from the headlines, and the wreckage starts to be cleared, the longterm problem remains huge, and with so many leg injuries there is going to be an ongoing need for wheelchairs

and for medical professionals to assist in fitting and advice. Through the Roof is fully equipped to contribute through our **Wheels for the World** programme. As regular readers will know, we recycle wheelchairs that would have been discarded, and have them refurbished to a very high standard at a prison. We then distribute them with expert medical and technical support to assist in fitting. We've a report from the recent Ghana distribution, illustrating what we do, later on in this newsletter.

However, to deliver to Haiti we need funding. Our target is to raise $\pounds 10,000$ to cover the cost of one distribution to Haiti (200 chairs) and if we raise more than this we can help with volunteer personal costs and more or larger distributions.





work areas varied from a church, verandas or under the trees. As always some of those who had registered did not come but many more came in hope and in most cases we were able to help them with some form of equipment. In one distribution area we found 15 chairs hidden behind the building! With some difficulty the owners were identified and many chairs were able to be repaired, although a couple did have to be scrapped. This freed up other chairs to be given to other clients.

On the Sunday, the team was able to visit 6 different churches between them, and were made welcome and enjoyed the experience of worship in Ghana. Most people had the opportunity to talk about why we were there, and share what the work of Wheels is all about. That evening we went to the community centre where many homeless people gather and are given tea and bread. One team member, Karl, was able to share the gospel with the adults while others sang songs with the children.

Karl also had the opportunity to talk and minister to nearly all those who received equipment. did not have much time to pray and their ability to translate was Many made a commitment to together, God was with us.

Christ, including two Muslims. On two occasions we had a group of people who were blind turning up hoping to get a white stick. Before they were sent away Karl said he would pray for them, as a result many of them miraculously had improved or clear sight.

We give God the Glory for all he enabled us to see, to hear and to do. For special moments like the joy on people's faces when they had a chair and a Bible, or seeing a man who waited all day and had been crying as he had not registered and needed a chair. Fantastically, the very last one was suitable for him! He was speechless but incredibly happy as for the first time in his life he didn't have to crawl everywhere.

This was excellent an all distribution, with the transported wheelchairs given away and several others repaired. In all, we saw over 300 people. The team worked very hard, often long days, with very little - if any break but always came up smiling. We all have memories of Ghana, both sad and happy, and were so grateful for all the prayer support we received from people at home. We knew that even when we

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


Letter from the CEO

It was necessary though and I felt a peace about it all, then the date was altered twice, one time being just as I was on the way to theatre! What was that all about?

So many times we are told 'God knows best' aren't we? We nod and say yes we know that, but do we really trust that He does know best? Just

before the third op date, was Christmas, which unexpectedly I was able to spend with my family, my nephew was home from Denver, and my young great niece was also there – a day I would have missed had I been in hospital as previously planned – I had a wonderful Christmas. The following days were spent at home and with friends, one friend in particular was with me a lot, along with her little dog. She needed encouragement and support in many ways, and we gave that to each other. Since she wasn't a believer, we were not able to share things of the Lord, but I believe those were very special days, for just before I went into hospital, my friend died – I was the last person to see her.

God knows best? Yes, He really does. None of the above would have been possible should the operation have taken place when first arranged. Not only was it good for me to have Christmas with family, but to spend those days with my friend, both for her and for me was very special. What an amazing God we have – and yes, the op has been successful and none of the black predictions given came to pass – prayers were answered. I'm not surprised - are you? God Knows Best!



Dear Roof-Breaking Friends...

Someone asked me the other day, "What is the biggest struggle most disabled people face?" I had a ready answer. "Himself," I answered, "or herself, as the case may be." It drew a funny look, so I explained, "When you have a disability, it screams for your undivided attention. It is very hard not to be constantly thinking about yourself and your own needs."

It's true. The constant aches and pains of arthritis or spinal cord injury, the daily maintenance of a wheelchair, or trying to find attendant care... all of it demands attention. These things can force a disabled person's focus inward. And so, the greatest challenge to people with disabilities is to keep pushing beyond the limitations to care about the needs of others.



The Message paraphrases Philippians 2:4-5 this way, 'Put yourself aside and help others. Don't be obsessed with getting your own advantage. Forget yourselves long enough to lend a helping hand. Think of yourselves the way Christ Jesus thought of Himself. He had equal status with God but didn't think so much of Himself that He had to cling to the advantages of that status.' My friends at Through the Roof would say the same. Friend, in 2010, keep looking outward... keep lending a helping hand... don't cling to your own wants and wishes... put yourself aside and help others in the name of Jesus!





Through the Roof's Training is a Waste of Time...

Unless, as the Bible and the theme of this newsletter says, 'whatever you have learned (is) put...into practice' (Philippians 4:9). Through the Roof's desire is that as a result of our training workshops, more churches will put into practice the ideas and activities they have learned, to welcome more disabled people into church life, and include the gifts and skills they have to give, so that everyone will be built up in their faith.

To maximise the potential impact of our workshops, they include real-life examples, and small group discussion of practical scenarios so those attending can learn from each other. Time is also dedicated to forming a personalised Action Plan relevant to the situation of the church and individuals. Over the last few months many churches and organisations have benefited including Salvation Army Pastoral Ministry students in South London. Olton Baptist church, Solihull and New Malden URC both received training to include young people with autism in church life; whilst Adeyfield Free Church and Oxford Vineyard Church hosted TTR trainers leading a workshop on the inclusion of young disabled people. Positive feedback from those attending included: 'Saturday's Disability Course was brilliant... It was very professionally presented without being intimidating, you might say user-friendly!' Graduates on the Leadership Programme at CARE's Institute for Faith and Culture, Central London received a session on 'A Christian Approach to Disability', with one delegate commenting that 'Through the Roof really challenged my idea and perception'.

Destination Europe

Disabled people in both the UK and developing countries have benefited from Through the Roof's work for several years and now TTR is extending its involvement to its European neighbours.

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Through the Roof recently joined with other Christian disability ministries from around Europe, including UK partners Causeway Prospects, at a Steering Group meeting of the European Disability Network (EDN) in Brussels. Development Manager, Tim Wood. was there to provide support and encouragement to those involved - most of whom are volunteers and affiliates of Joni and Friends - whilst also ensuring TTR brings a positive inclusive influence, along with other members of the group, to the wider European Christian scene. Plans are underway for a Hope For Europe conference in 2011 for different European-wide Christian networks (e.g. Education, Theology etc.) to attend, at which EDN is seeking to present disability as an integral issue for all groups, churches and networks to address. This will challenge churches and Christian Ministries to ensure the needs of disabled people across Europe are considered.

"It's a privilege to be invited to this event," said Jacky, "most importantly, I'm attending to ensure that the inclusive language does indeed mean everyone, including those of us who live with some form of disability."

Cape Town 2010, held in collaboration with the World Evangelical Alliance, will bring together 4,000 leaders from more than 200 countries to confront how the critical issues of our time - other world faiths, poverty, HIV/AIDS and persecution, among others – relate to the future of the Church and world evangelization.

Thousands more leaders will participate in the discussion on the issues through the Lausanne Global Conversation and at remote congress sites through the Cape Town Globalink. 

Every year the auditors also send a management letter to our board with any general comments or points to note. 
Simon, Sarah and Amy
