'An Extraordinary Blessing from God'

That was how one parent summed up Through the Roof's holiday for families living with autism. This was the fifth holiday we have run at the Dalesdown centre, and it was great

to see that over half of the families were coming back for more!

The programme included the activity trail and games, craft, and swimming expedition, plus praise parties and times of worship, reflection and meditation. We included an outing on the Bluebell Railway, and took advantage of the talents of our team, adding dance and drama and handbell ringing to the programme.

Every year, we're told that the holiday's success lies in providing one-to-one helpers trained in dealing with autism. They enable parents to choose to spend 'time together' as a family, (in one case, getting to swim together for the first time), or to spend 'time out', away from their children, relaxing in the knowledge that they are in safe hands.

One parent wrote, "I can't praise the helpers highly enough, they were utterly

necessary and brilliant with the children". The respite starts immediately

 on the first afternoon parents eagerly escaped for a cream tea at

escaped for a cream tea at the garden centre, where they shared experiences and scones. We also include the siblings of autistic children in all activities, so that they too have some relief from caring for their brother or sister.

One returning parent wrote: "Dalesdown has again exceeded my expectations. This holiday allows me time to relax, de-stress and unwind; time to meditate, pray and worship. I can hand over all the decisions I normally make, such as what to do and what to eat."



Fleming Fulton School Visit Container

Vocal about PROJECTISION Baliva

Project Inclusion is a new national competition for young people to get creative by writing a song that promotes inclusion. Winners will have the opportunity to record their song for a compilation CD.

We're partnering with another Christian charity, Act 4, in the new project and have Christian hip hop artist, Baliva, involved to write a song especially for it.

Project Inclusion aims to involve thousands of young people from church groups and schools in devising song lyrics expressing their feelings on discrimination and disability, performing it to spread awareness, then entering the annual competition.

Colour posters, Bible story dramas and music beats are available free to download from our website www.youth.throughtheroof.org/projectinclusion. A curriculum-linked resource pack will be available for schools in the near future. Young people will be able to learn about the injustices surrounding disability, and then have a vehicle to tell the world about inclusion.

Tim Wood, who heads up TTR's Integr8 programme, said, "With this exciting project we intend that thousands of people will hear the message that all of us are of equal value in God's sight."

A Gift for Wheels



On Monday 8th April, representatives from the Redeemed Christian Church of God visited us at Through the Roof's office with a £10,000 cheque for the work of Wheels for the World. Pastor Andrew Adeleke of the House of Praise church presented CEO Jacky Oliver with the cheque, and made a speech saying the people of RCCG wanted to bless the people in Haiti. Ever since the devastating earthquake in January, the RCCG has been encouraging members to financially support the work being carried out in Haiti, and they've made donations to seven agencies working to carry out long-term rehabilitation. We're excited and blessed to be one of those.


A Zone for All

Through the Roof partnered with other disability ministries at the Christian Resources Exhibition at Esher recently in a brand new 'Churches for All' zone.

Visitors to this unique area were able to attend mini-workshops, including 'Disability and the Bible'; and join in interactive activities, such as an introduction to British Sign Language, as well as find relevant resources and publications for their churches.

Many readers will have heard the story of Violet, the lady in Western Kenya who lay for sixteen years in a dark hut before receiving a visit from members of Wheels for the World team in 2001. Following that visit a video of Violet was shown to prisoners in Long Larten prison and one of those prisoners was so affected by Violet's story that he designed and built a trolley that would enable Violet to leave her hut.

The trolley was delivered by the Wheels team in 2002 and transformed Violet's life. Since that time Violet has been able to not only oversee the planting of her crops but has become a valuable member of her community through her service to her church.

In 2007, a reporter for BBC World Service heard this story and went to interview Violet to hear about the transformation in Violet's life. So it was that people from all round the world were able to hear how the gift of mobility changes lives.

The whole Wheels for the World Kenya team visited Violet in March this year and two techies, Nigel Davey and Andrew Smith, repaired the trolley whilst the rest of the team were entertained by the many children in the compound.

We left with the gift of three live chickens and our hearts warmed by this amazing lady!

Sharing God's Heart for Inclusion

Life-long friends, Christina and Philippa, are joining this year's Integr8 team to Guatemala to inspire a spirit of inclusion within local communities. Philippa, who is totally blind, told Vital Link about their creative fundraising, and how they spread the inclusive message too...

'Firstly, Christina and I have booked to speak in several churches to share our story. We also came up with the idea of having a concert. I sing and Christina plays the piano and violin, but we needed other people to perform, so we sent our local paper, the Biggleswade

Chronicle, details of the trip and asked if they would mention the concert to recruit performers. Within days I was interviewed and photographed by their journalists and the story appeared in the Chronicle that week. Thank the Lord, it was a fantastic article and every detail was accurate.

The response to the concert has been overwhelming and it is now in danger of over-running! Songs of Praise presenter, Pam Rhodes, is local to us and has offered to compere the concert whilst the church that we are using is providing refreshments as their contribution.

As a result of the newspaper article, we have had cheques through the post from people who don't even know us, but have been inspired by the article. We will also be featured in 'Evangelicals Now' (in July). We emailed Premier Christian radio about the trip and they

interviewed me for the news and on a live late night chat show which all helped to spread the word further.

We held a Guatemala evening at our church, so people would be aware of where we were going and we are running a blind awareness day where people can use a sighted guide and experience everyday tasks as if blind.

We have been amazed at the response to our various fundraising schemes. Distant relations and strangers have sent us money, churches have contributed, and we have been given things to sell such as home-made cards and pads. Every week Christina's Nan takes a collection at her ladies meetings for us. Everyone has been good to us, and God is amazing. So far we have raised £600 and gained lots of prayers and interest on the way!

We thank God for the many things Through the Roof has been doing in the last few months - hopefully, this issue of VL will give you a taste of that work. In the last few months, I have been at Epsom Golf Club to raise funds for our Wheels for the World programme and launching our Wheels for Haiti fundraiser with guest speaker Chris Grayling MP. As we go to print we have raised £22,361 enough to do so much more than we hoped, so keep giving and keep praying.

I was also on The HMS President, a ship on the River Thames, presenting at a 'Christian Dragons Den'-type event called 'Cross Pollinate'. A nerve-wracking experience, but imagine our joy when we saw the number of gifts gradually rise to £17650 (more with gift aid!) All this is with the help of Through the Roof staff and volunteers. We have raised an encouraging amount of money to help disabled people in developing countries with the gift of a wheelchair, Bible and professional advice from our volunteers teams of qualified professional physiotherapists and occupational therapists. Our challenge now is to raise funds for the other services that Through the Roof provides. This has involved me being away from my desk for disability awareness training in Bromley, recording two programmes for Premier Insight programme in Market Harborough, helping with the new Churches for All venue at the Esher Christian Resources Exhibition and attending London meetings in preparation for a visit to Kenya and the Cape Town Lausanne Congress. So - as I return to my desk to write to you all again - I am reminded that we do not work alone but with the care and protection of a wonderful God, and the love and support of many of you reading this latest Vital Link.



Wheels for Sammy

Sammy Olesimpai is a neighbour of the guide who escorted us at the Masai Parini Camp during our Wheels distribution in Kenya. When I told him why we were in Kenya he reported to me that his neighbour had been in a wheelchair for 10 years, but was very uncomfortable in it.

He offered to take me in the safari jeep to the Masai village where Sammy lived. I was greeted by a group of men – all in their Masai red and orange tunics, with Sammy sitting in the middle, in a child's chair, even though he was 29. He had had polio when he was

Sammy (sat in the wheelchair in the centre)

19 and his trunk was twisted and his legs wasted. His feet were

balanced on a piece of string. There was nothing I could do to his existing chair, but I offered to try and secure a more appropriate wheelchair for him, which was to be transported to him by the camp's area manager who lived in Kitale (from where we flew to and from Nairobi). Having got the Wheels' team approval, I sourced a chair which I hoped would be more appropriate and arranged with IcFEM's Paul Stephens for Paul to take it to Kitale. The chair was dismantled, duct-taped together with alum keys, a spanner and a Wheels leaflet, and taken to Kitale. An exchange of texts suggested that the chair was picked up from Kitale and taken on to help Sammy; we pray that the effort will bring great relief and pleasure to him – and praise to God!

Putting the 'Fun' in Fundraising

Support for 'Wheels' widens in Ashtead as the Wheels 4 Haiti appeal touches many people's' hearts. Pupils at Greville Primary School raised £430 for 'Wheels 4 Haiti' by creating collages of coins they had collected, producing maps of the countries where Wheels distributions have taken place. The retiring collection after the school concerts was also donated to the appeal.

As well as the school's efforts, dedicated 'Wheels' supporters from St Giles' and St George's raised over £4,400 by saving £1 a day for the 40 days of Lent, this year supporting the 'Wheels 4 Haiti' appeal. 'It has become an annual event for the Ashtead churches, with support increasing each year. One younger member of the church encouraged his family to take part and gave up his after school snack to give his £1 a day!' said Karen Goodridge, Ashtead churches representative and volunteer fundraiser for Through the Roof.
