


Delivering Wheelchairs and Drawing Crowds Wheels for the World in Butaleja, Uganda 2018



Has a Plan For Me Too

Travelling by minibus to the main wheelchair distribution site in Nabiganda, just southwest of Mbale, our Wheels team stopped to buy water from a shop beside the red dust road. On the ground outside the entrance to the store they met William, a beggar with no legs and only one arm. He wasn't able to get to the distribution site, so the team returned to him a few days later. In a scene reminiscent of Bible times where Jesus and his disciples stopped to minister to people at the side of the road, first-time team leader, Anj; carefully fitted William with the wheelchair they'd specially reserved for him, while team pastor, Ola, ministered to curious passers-by.



As the chair was being fitted, another disabled man, Charles, turned up. The dedicated team came back later on and were able to give him a chair too, and invite a girl who begged on the same patch to come to the site for assessment, where she also received a chair. The shop owner allows these three to stay outside his shop and beg even though it's normally not allowed. We pray that this practical demonstration of love will encourage the crowd who gathered to look to God and not to marginalise those with disabilities, especially disabled people living on the street.

Anj, had previously visited Butaleja with a Wheels for the World team two years ago. Back then she had met a little girl called Afua, who needed a mobility aid. Anj was disappointed as she realised the team couldn't help her because they just didn't have a suitable wheelchair to meet her needs. It's very different from being at home where customised chairs would be readily available. Imagine how Anj felt when she met 9 year-old Afua again on this latest trip. Would Anj have to give her bad news for a second time? Afua was hopeful that this would be her big day - the day she received a wheelchair. Thankfully, this time, things were different! After taking careful measurements Anj spotted a chair that could possibly meet the girl's needs. But then, encouragingly, she discovered an even more suitable fit – a bright red chair that was perfect for her. It was uplifting to be able to provide something just right for Afua, and amazing to see how happy and excited she and her mother were to finally have a chair. A whole family, and possibly even a whole community changed by the gift of one wheelchair.

When the team had arrived on the first day, they found a crowd of people already waiting. This isn't unusual for a Wheels distribution – often people will wait all day for the opportunity of receiving the gift of a wheelchair. On that first day, 40 people were seen and assessed. Depending on the individual's disability there are a few options available – a wheelchair isn't right for everybody. In some cases, crutches may help improve mobility or at least prevent someone losing strength or skills.

If a wheelchair is the right thing to issue, the therapist will select a suitable chair. It may not be an exact fit, so they're often modified by our skilled techies, engineering adaptations to demonstrate love and care for each person. Once the chair's complete the therapist will explain how to use it and then each individual has the opportunity to receive a Bible in their own language and pray with the team pastor.

The team saw around 250 people in total, and distributed 130 wheelchairs, plus scores of crutches and mobility aids. It's been great to hear about the fantastic team spirit of the 10 volunteers – some first-timers, some veterans of many trips – and how working with our in-country partners, RILD, they've changed the lives of so many people through the gift of a refurbished wheelchair. Some of the team were even fitting chairs in impromptu clinics to people in need at their hotel on the final evening.

We're planning two more Wheels trips this year (Kenya from the 5th to the 15th of September, and Nigeria from the 14th to the 24th of November), and we're always researching future venues, partners, and distributions. God Has a Plan For Me Too

15 year old Becky spoke at our recent Roofbreaker event. She writes: I have quadriplegic cerebral palsy. At birth my brain had no oxygen for so long, I nearly died. My brain can't control my muscles. I can't sit up unaided, stand up, balance or walk. I find it hard to eat. I can't talk with my mouth so I 'speak' using a communication aid with my eyes.

Disabled people are made in God's image and loved by God just like non-disabled people. We're not inferior if our bodies or minds work differently. No part of the body can tell another part it's not needed (1 Corinthians 12.21). Disabled people are a much needed part of the body of Christ.

God has a wheelchair too (Daniel 7.9) and God's plans include everyone. I have a superpower – my ability to use eye-gaze technology to talk and use a computer. It's the only thing I can do completely independently. God uses my eye-gaze skills to reach other people. At Greenbelt I preached to over 6,000 people!

I love my powered wheelchair, it helps me get around. But I can't go where there are stairs, narrow doorways or corridors. I can't use standard disabled toilets; they're not big enough for my wheelchair, and I need a hoist. So without a suitable toilet, I have to wear a pad or go home.

I want to feel I belong in and contribute to a community, but for that my basic needs must be catered for. Is your baptistery accessible to someone who can't walk? Why do baptisteries have steps and no hoists? Communication is a challenge for me. It can take a long time to write a sentence, so it's difficult to have conversations and make friends. My pet hate is being spoken to like a baby. People are often scared to talk to me because they don't know how, or what to say.

Sudden noises like screechy PA systems or loud worship events startle me and give me uncontrollable movements. It makes my head physically hurt and I have to leave.

Buildings can be made accessible. Ramps are betters than stairs! Chairs are more accessible and inclusive than pews. I'm grateful my local church has installed a Changing Places toilet so I can stay and belong to the community there.

Disabled people are not people you do ministry for, they are people you do ministry with. Disability ministry is about doing church together. When communicating, don't just talk to my parents or carer, please talk to me. Training courses in ministry subjects and theological studies are not so accessible to disabled people like me. I hope this will change. God has a plan for us too!

Purpose and Plans

Do you ever wonder if God has any purpose for you? Many disabled people struggle with their personal sense of value (and it's not just disabled people!)

I am writing this just after our first Every Church Needs a Roofbreaker day in Ashtead. The keynote message drew our attention to an amazing fact. We are 'created in the image of God' (Genesis 1:27). We all reflected on what this means. Does it include everyone? Even those with profound disabilities who struggle to communicate?

I used to run family houseparties. In the evenings I told the children exciting serial stories illustrating God's message for the day. Daniel was a regular from the age of eight. He had absolutely no communication, and just lay there in his flat carriage. I used to wonder if he understood anything. When Daniel was thirteen, he arrived with a communication aid. He used Dectalk synthetic speech - like Stephen Hawking. Daniel had broken the communication barrier! He described to me, in great detail, the stories I had told them back to when he was eight.

In the silence, God spoke to Daniel and he was now finding purpose in telling others about Jesus.

At the Roofbreaker day, we were privileged to have Becky Tyler speak. Becky had preached at the main Sunday service at Greenbelt last year. She is 15, and uses a computer to speak, controlling it with her eyes. She

prepared her sermon in advance, and delivered it very effectively using glances to the screen.

Referring to the book of Romans (8:28), 'In all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose', Becky testified that with her profound disabilities she is "created in God's image" and therefore God has a plan for her. "All things" are not always "good". But the real meaning of that verse is that God uses our experiences for his "good" purposes.

There are two sides to the work of Roofbreakers. Firstly, they enable disabled people to engage with church. Roofbreakers look for ways to include people and encourage leadership to make this happen. However, real belonging is a two way street. We are not just "to be served but to serve". Roofbreaking includes enabling disabled people to use our gifts for the glory of God.

God has a plan for Becky, for me, and for you too.

Richer for Sharing

The South East Baptist Association recently gathered church representatives from across the region for a Disability Awareness Day. Through the Roof were invited to present and we were delighted to speak alongside Susan Myatt, the first Deaf ordained Baptist Minister; as well as friends, Pete and Christine Winmill of Count Everyone In ministry; and staff and a volunteer from Torch Trust's Holiday & Retreat Centre.

All the presenters spoke on the common theme of the uniqueness of all people made in God's image, and the particular contribution that every disabled person brings.

In feedback, delegates commented that the day had been helpful and enlightening. One told us, "A big thank you for all your input into our church lives. We are the richer for your sharing."

Another asked whether "Ministers should update their

training in the way that GPs, Social Workers etc do? Perhaps churches need to reconsider how we worship - we use a lot of words!"

Even the organiser, Rev Jerry Newson (Regional Minister), went away committed to take things further. He told us, "It has inspired me to do what I can to ensure the whole subject of Disability Awareness is given a much higher priority across the South Eastern Baptist Churches."

When I See Her, I See God

Churches Inc in Elburgon By Kerry-Lee Tamlyn

Smati is a young girl in rural Kenya with cerebral palsy who was brought by her mother to one of our workshops. Her mother exclaimed, "I thank God for Smati's life. Through her many people came together. She was fed through tubes and given oxygen after she was born, and then she came back to life. When I see her now, I see God. When I see the way she is, I see her as my wealth. I know God has a purpose for her that I may reach out to others so that they will love their children with disabilities". It is people like Smati and her mother who embody the message we bring on our Churches inc mission trips.

This trip to Elburgon in Kenya was hosted by our longstanding partner, Rev. Davis Gatua, Founder of the Hope of Glory Centre for People With Disabilities. Four hundred leaders, including pastors, community leaders, and local government leaders attended the Leaders Event to hear how God views disabled people like Smati. A further four hundred people attended our workshops to learn about the barriers to inclusion and how to combat them.

We saw a tremendous shift in attitude of the pastors who came along. They were strongly challenged by God's Word, and personal experiences of disability. Their attention was captured, their hearts were moved, and attitudes that have prevented the Church from responding to disability were

confronted. One of our team members, Pastor Shadrack from Tanzania shared how his own father was born with disabilities in a village where people believe that disabled people bring misfortune in the way of famine to the village. The consensus there is that such a person needs to be killed or banished. But his grandmother ran away to save the baby's life and now his father is a respected pastor.

We appealed to the pastors to preach that 'God's power is made perfect in weakness' rather than a false prosperity message that God only favours 'the strong'. We challenged them to talk openly about disability so that it is not a taboo subject, and so that people can have the confidence to tell them about relatives hidden in their homes.

A Churches Inc. team will be travelling to Sierra Leone from the 9th to the 17th of October – we're looking for a few more people to join the team, particularly those with a background in teaching, or who have practical experience of working with disabled people, have a personal story of disability to share, or who have photographic, administrative or pastoral skills.
