"I don't need working legs for God to use me"



Jade Reynolds believes we need to think differently about disabled people. Her assertion that 'I don't need working legs for God to use me' is not an aspiration – it's her life story.

Aged 12 Jade's life changed overnight as a rare condition paralysed her spine, leaving her needing a wheelchair. Now, Jade, and her husband John, who are Theology graduates, are seeking to dispel the stigma surrounding disability.

The couple are Spring Harvest speakers with 1 million 'followers' on social media: @johnejreynolds. They presented at our online Roofbreaker event where Jade recounted her story before they encouraged attendees to share the power of their own story with others. During four months in hospital, the support Jade's church provided was a witness to staff. Since then, God has used Jade to bring hope and encouragement to many. Whether we admit it or not, everyone needs others – and God.

Jade says that disabled people have discovered that truth through their own lived experience. "Chronic illness, pain or disability are not obstacles to God", she says. "He can use you in every circumstance – And he's not just going to use you in spite of your disability or illness, he's going to use you because of that. Because that's how God works."

Jade read **2 Corinthians 12: 9-11**, and commented, "I think that's such an encouraging verse because God uses our weaknesses, and... as someone with a disability, I'm very aware of my weaknesses... my limitations. Sometimes I find that frustrating. But if that's going to keep pointing me to God then that's amazing. That's the only thing that really matters!"



Jade and John are changing minds as they speak and share videos about everyday life with honesty and humour – which helps normalise disability. Jade comments that people often say:

"I don't share your faith, but you're really normal and funny!" That normalising of our faith and disability makes it worthwhile...
People are more open if they know you're speaking honestly from your life experience."

Sharing stories for Disability Awareness Sunday

Retired Baptist minister and hospital chaplain, Revd Andrew Miles, has an incredible story which he shared on video for Disability Awareness Sunday.

In 2014, as a preacher in Brazil, Andrew and his wife Talita were injured in a car crash. A drunken driver asleep at the wheel smashed into the back of their car while they waited at a red light. Andrew is now a wheelchair user with an assistance dog called Rolo.

Andrew says: "I think because I've seen God do so many wonderful things and I've had such an amazing journey with God, even in that situation, which was extremely difficult, I wasn't going to let anything destroy my faith." A significant Bible passage for Andrew is Mark 4 where Jesus calms the storm. Andrew says, "Sometimes storms blow up in our lives and things aren't easy, but God is always with us and God isn't finished with any of us. There's a purpose and a plan He has for each one of us to be a blessing to other people."

This year we celebrated a whole Disability
Awareness Week, launched by Methodist Church
President, Revd Helen Cameron, at a special service.
Helen shared daily videos focussed on disability
inclusion which can be seen on YouTube
@TTRChangesLives.

Across the UK, churches held Disability Awareness Sunday services, including Cairnlea Parish Church in Airdrie, Scotland. Lis Johnstone and her husband lan are both disabled and were asked to lead a service. They explored the role of disabled people in sharing the gospel of Christ. Using TTR's resources and 'Andrew's Story', Lis and Ian said their thought-provoking content challenged people, and their church's response was very positive.

UCB Radio also celebrated the week, featuring daily 3-minute audio recordings from five disabled TTR supporters sharing their experiences. Listen on our YouTube channel @TTRChangesLives to UCB1 'disability diaries' and share the link with others. Here are quotes from two diaries.

Michael: "advice to anyone encountering a disabled person is just try to treat them as you would anyone else."

"I did activities that I never thought I'd be able to do!"

This was the story of several holiday-goers, including Ellen, at our Calvert Trust holiday. She experienced the exhilaration of crate stacking from her wheelchair 20 feet up in the air!! People enjoyed abseiling, zip wire, canoeing, horse-riding and swimming – guided by qualified instructors who provided skills, equipment and encouragement.

People from 7 different nations, aged 19 - 70+, gathered for the holiday so it seemed appropriate to use Revelation chapter 7 as Biblical inspiration. It describes a 'great multitude of people from every nation, tribe, people and language before the throne of God.' It reflected the sense of togetherness amongst everyone.

Centre staff exceeded our expectations.

Nothing was too much trouble for them, which complemented TTR's family feel where we look out for, encourage, and support one another. One guest commented: "The location is beautiful. Staff are very kind and helpful." Our last evening of Communion together and worshipping God through music and sign language was very moving.

Lives transformed in Rwanda

A Wheels for the World team distributed lifechanging mobility aids in Rwanda to disabled people who don't have the money or opportunity to buy one. Volunteer therapist, Jill Jenkinson, shares about the mission trip...

"Time was of an essence and God's timing was perfect. We arrived to find the container still locked on a lorry. By late afternoon the Customs Agent had inspected the contents, and the team had sorted everything ready for distribution next morning to change the lives of people like Appoffie...

Appoffie had polio and crawled until given a wheelchair in 2004, which is now unusable. She crawls or is carried while looking after 3 grandchildren. They live 'hand to mouth' relying on the goodness of neighbours as they beg for food. I was so pleased to have assessed and fitted her with a wheelchair for her needs. Appoffie is a basket weaver and with her newly found independence plans to set up a small business.

It was a memorable surprise to witness Appoffie, seen only the day before, in church on Sunday! Unable to attend church for such a long time, the wheelchair we provided enabled her to visit at the first opportunity. She glowed with happiness and attended the entire service - even joining her old choir to sing her heart out. What joy!

Rwanda is a beautiful country with lovely people proudly rebuilding their infrastructure following the genocide horrors. Partners, FHR, work with disabled and marginalised people within Eastern Province. Our distribution helped raise the profile of disability and the great work FHR are doing. The equipment we provide is extremely scarce... one man told us that the wheelchair he'd received would cost ten years' wages!

Pastor Dominque, our main contact, held a Roofbreaker Conference last year, so we saw local people who'd been identified and assessed by FHR. Their volunteers were organised, thoughtful and keen to learn more about disability whilst interpreting and caring for recipients. The pastoral team shared God's love with beneficiaries who received Bibles in their own language. We heard harrowing stories, but each of the 203 recipients who received mobility aids, like Emmanuel, can now look forward to more positive futures...

Emmanuel was herding cattle when he stepped on a landmine blowing off both feet and killing two cows. He lay alone in the field until found by neighbours who took him to hospital where he spent 6 months.

He has been without a wheelchair for 3 years, so his friends daily carry him to a kiosk where he sells mobile data cards. Now he's thrilled to have the independence to push himself to work, restoring his dignity and selfworth - freedom indeed!

The gift of a wheelchair or walking aid and a Bible is truly life transforming!"

Luke 5 Award for Rich Tea Community

The Rich Tea Community, a group for adults with additional needs meets in the Countess Free Church in Ely, Cambridgeshire. The community and its Cofounder Cate Allen received our Luke 5 Award for disability inclusion.

Beyond the barriers

Access to church isn't always easy for adults with additional needs. Many are dependent on others to bring them to church.

Church services may also create barriers to understanding and a feeling of belonging – such as complex and figurative language, few visuals to help with processing information, and sensory extremes from silence to loud music... All these factors can be difficult.

Friendship, faith and fun for all

Rich Tea Community (RTC) was founded to overcome these barriers and to create accessible church in Ely. RTC gathers monthly on a Sunday, at Countess Free Church for friendship, faith and fun for adults with additional needs – plus volunteers, family, friends and carers. An engaging short talk is accompanied by sensory objects and visual aids.

The award was presented at RTC alongside parachute games, table tennis, craft and music.

Co-founder, Margaret Human, gave the certificate to Cate Allen and flowers were presented by Sarah Best, an RTC member and nominator for a previous Luke 5 Award.

Margaret, who has additional needs herself, made the award nomination because she really enjoys RTC. She said:

"At Rich Tea, I lead prayers and do readings. I feel part of the church and like I really belong and am valued. We started the group to share about Jesus with people with learning disabilities and let them know God loves them and church is a welcoming place for them."

Cate Allen, a Roofbreaker and Baptist Minister awaiting ordination, said: "The need is huge for reaching people who are often left out of church and society, yet have amazing gifts to offer. We have been running Rich Tea sessions for people in local care homes, as well as providing small-group faith-building sessions for current RTC members."

Luke 5 Award nominations are welcomed from disabled people wanting to celebrate the positive experience they have had in a church or Christian ministry.

Do you have a story to tell?

We all have our own unique experiences which can encourage and build others up. Through the Roof is partnering with Small Voice Projects to equip disabled people to tell their stories of faith using a smartphone.

Jazz Shaban, a Roofbreaker and video maker is offering 'Kingdom Storytellers – 90 second stories' – an online workshop plus follow-up mentoring to disabled Christians wanting to share their story on video.

Katie Budd (nee Mobbs) shares her reflections on the workshop:

"At Through the Roof we are working to enable more disabled people to be commissioned to use their experiences gifts and skills to share God's love with those around them. I saw this 'commissioning' in action as story after story was shared in the workshop.

Using the medium of our favourite photograph, Jazz taught us how to build a structure around key points and think through the message we want to

leave with our audience. It was brilliant to see people's stories unfold, testifying to the way that people had seen God at work in their lives. The stories highlighted that no two people's experience of disability is the same, but God's faithfulness is constant.

Some of these key themes emerged: the love and faithfulness of God; resilience; the importance of community; advocacy; and the importance of education. I am very excited to see the final videos!"

Stories of Praise

We were delighted when BBC TV programme Songs of Praise got in touch for an interview.

They chose to interview Jazz Shaban about her journey to faith which led her to work with disabled people in international development. We were thrilled that they also wanted to mention Through the Roof and Jazz's Kingdom Storytellers workshops.

Here, Roofbreaker, Lynda Herbert shares some of her experience of the workshops:

"I was very pleased to have the opportunity to join the Kingdom Storytellers Workshop with Jazz Shaban on Zoom. The purpose of her initiative to equip disabled people to video their faith stories in under two minutes. It is a wonderful and encouraging initiative. It gives voice to those whose stories might not otherwise be heard.

I wasn't the only one fascinated by this, as the team from Songs of Praise recorded a staged version of the workshop, but it did not make the final cut for the show.

Jazz spoke about how the Kingdom Storytellers project works to give voices to those of us who are disabled.

She also shared her inspiration and some of her life story. She was awesome, and I hope you get to hear her story on Songs of Praise (from 3 November) on catch-up for yourself."

The story of easyfundraising

'Fundraising' can conjure up images of gruelling marathons or hours spent baking or crafting things to sell. But one entrepreneur used his business knowledge to create a way to fundraise for free, through the spending power we hold, as consumers. This is the story of easyfundraising founder, Ian Woodroffe.

It all began at a New Year's party in 2002. Ian Woodroffe was an account manager for a telecommunications company. It was in the early days of online shopping. Ian knew that companies were willing to invest to get customers to visit their websites.

At that time, Ian was being treated for cancer, so spent a lot of time in hospital. While there, he heard a lot of conversations between nurses and patients about charities needing funding. He realised there are many people who hold causes very dear to their hearts who are prepared to use their time and energy to support those charities.

lan also knew how to harness the power of big business. He had a revelation: why not ask businesses to pay a small charity donation in return for people's custom? All charity supporters would need to do is to access online shopping sites via a tracking website, so donations are registered. The idea of easyfundraising was born!

Work began in 2003, and easyfundraising was officially launched in 2005. Since then, over £50 million has been raised for more than 180,000 charities and causes. Ian says, "Our purpose is simple. Together we turn the everyday spending of life into a force for good."
